Worship Notes First Sunday in Lent – March 9, 2025

We welcome our members and guests who are worshiping with us today, and pray God's rich blessings upon you during this time of worship!

THEME

Believers who confess the name of Jesus strive against evil assaults that distort God-given truths. In the church, the Word of God prevails as it is proclaimed, confessed, and believed. The Word, on Jesus' own lips, repels the onslaught of Satan, who, in the midst of Jesus' anguish, asserts false claims and authority. As we witness the clash between Satan and Jesus, we cling to His own words with heart, mind, and voice: "You shall worship the Lord your God . . ."

ORDER OF WORSHIP

This morning we follow and adaptation of Setting Four of the Divine Service. During the season of Lent we omit the *Gloria in Excelsis* (or other hymns of praise) from our liturgy, as well as all "alleluias", as we focus on the penitential nature of the season.

HYMN OF THE DAY

Our hymn of the day this 1st Sunday in Lent, often called the "Battle Hymn of the Reformation," was actually written as a hymn of comfort during trying times throughout Europe. Martin Luther's "A Mighty Fortress", draws inspiration from Psalm 46. It has been translated into almost every know language, including at least 80 different English translations! As our Gospel focuses on Jesus' temptation by the devil, this hymn speaks of how, through Him, we can also stand fast against the wiles of the devil! The tune, EIN FESTE BURG, is also the work of Luther. It presumably first appeared in 1529. As a young student, Luther earned money to pay his school fees by singing in the streets of Eisenach, and he also played the lute. Music was always in important part of his life, and he wrote "Next to the Word of God, music deserves the highest praise."

As We Observe National Lutheran Schools Week:

This weekend begins the observation of *National Lutheran Schools Week* at Immanuel. This year's theme is "Endure" (*Hebrews 12:1-3*), taken from the theme from this summer's upcoming National Youth Gathering in New Orleans. In these verses we are encouraged to run the race marked out for us, encouraged by the great cloud of witnesses who surround us.

Each day throughout the school week there are sub-themes that build on this:

Monday: "Setting Aside Hindrances"

Identifying and overcome hindrances to our faith in Christ.

(*Hebrews* 12:1)

Tuesday: "Fixing Our Eyes on Jesus"

Maintaining Jesus as the focal point of our lives.

(*Hebrews* 12:2)

Wednesday: "Enduring the Cross"

Reflecting on Christ's suffering and sacrifice for our salvation.

(*Hebrews* 12:2)

Thursday: "The Joy Set Before Us"

Celebrating the joy and hope we have in Jesus Christ.

(Hebrews 12:2)

Friday: "Running the Race with Perseverance"

Encouraging perseverance in the Christian faith.

(*Hebrews* 12:1-2)

Our closing hymn this morning, *With Endurance Run Your Race*, written by Dr. Jeffrey Burkart, brings this home to us!






