Worship Notes Second Sunday in Lent – March 16, 2025

We welcome our members and guests who are worshiping with us today, and pray God's rich blessings upon you during this time of worship!

THEME

There is no room for impenitence. Jeremiah preaches death for those who do not respond to God's voice. Death is imminent. But Jesus is the great reversal, pressing toward Jerusalem where He dies for sinners. Jerusalem entombed many prophets before Jesus. And now she is soon to be the gateway for Jesus' threeday journey from cross to tomb. Those who oppose His cross collide with destruction and shame. Those who cling to the cross are declared beloved citizens of heaven.

ORDER OF WORSHIP

This morning we follow Setting Four of the Divine Service. During the season of Lent the Church has traditionally omitted the Gloria in Excelsis and alleluias to emphasize the penitential nature of the season. "Alleluia" will return to or worship on Easter!

HYMN OF THE DAY

Our hymn of the day today is "O Little Flock, Fear Not the Foe." Throughout the years the text has been attributed to King Gustavus Adolphus of Sweden, to Johann Michael Altenburg, and to Jacob Fabricius. Current thinking is that Gustavus Adolphus wrote the prose version, and asked Chaplain Jacob Fabricius to versify it. The hymn has been often associated with warfare, and Christian warfare, dating back to the Battle of Lützen in 1632, where the king supposedly sang it before his death. The tune is a 15th century German folk tune.

The fact that the hymn bears the number 666 – the number of the beast in Revelation 13:18 – serves as a subtle reminder that Christians have no need to fear Satan with Christ by our side!

What our Church Believes, Teaches and and Confesses regarding The Lord's Supper

The Bible teaches that Jesus gives us His very body and blood along with bread and wine in Holy Communion¹, and that these are means by which He forgives our sins², strengthens us for daily living, and draws us into closer fellowship with Him and other believers. The Bible also teaches us to examine ourselves prior to receiving the meal³. For those receiving Holy Communion, examine yourself with these questions:

Do I believe that I am a sinner and am I sorry for my sins?

Do I believe that Jesus Christ is God's Son and my personal Savior?

Do I believe that Christ's true body and blood are present in this holy meal for my forgiveness?


Do I truly intend with the help of God to correct my sinful life?


Our Lord invites to His table those who trust His words, repent of all sin, and set aside any refusal to forgive and love as He forgives and loves us, that they may show forth His death until He comes. Those who are not members of a Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod congregation and have not communed at Immanuel previously are asked to speak with a pastor prior to the service. Those who are of a different confession (i.e., church body)⁴ or are unsure about communing, are invited to come forward during distribution with their hands folded in prayer, or held close to the chest and receive a blessing.



Together as His people let us take refuge in the infinite mercy of God, our heavenly Father, seeking His grace for the sake of Christ, and saying: God, be merciful to me, a sinner.

Almighty God in His mercy has given His Son to die for you and for His sake forgives you all your sins. As a called and ordained servant of Christ, and by His authority, I therefore forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the + Son and of the Holy Spirit.



Nicene Creed



Communion Confession

- P The Lord's Supper is God's gift for Christians who are properly instructed. In communing, we want people to receive Christ's body and blood for their good. This means that as you come to the Lord's Table you affirm with each communicant that Jesus is your Savior and Lord; and with Lutheran Christians you confess:
- **C** I recognize and confess that I am a sinner. I repent of my sin and ask God's forgiveness.

I believe that Jesus Christ is my only Lord and Savior from sin, Satan and death.

I believe that the risen Christ is really present in the Sacrament and, under the form of the bread and wine, I receive His true body and blood for the forgiveness of my sins and the strengthening of my faith and life.

(Augsburg Confession – Article X)

I resolve to dedicate my life to the service of my Lord in His Body, the Church, by regular group worship, sacrificial giving, thankful living and sharing the Gospel with others. (*Romans* 12:1)


Consecration - The Words of Our Lord


Post-Communion Collect


