Worship Notes Fifth Sunday in Lent – April 6, 2025

We welcome our members and guests who are worshiping with us today, and pray God's rich blessings upon you during this time of worship!

THEME

Remembering and conveying truth is vital! Paul recounts his impressive Jewish credentials and yet confesses the truth—they are but rubbish. Through Isaiah, the Lord reminds us of the exodus—God's divine action of destruction and rescue. Jesus addresses the Pharisees with divine truths embedded in a parable. God owns the vineyard tended by corrupt religious leaders; the servants are the rejected prophets, and the beloved Son is Jesus. These are divine truths—by God's design, Jesus' destruction is imminent, but resurrection is forever.

ORDER OF WORSHIP

This morning we follow Setting One of the Divine Service, introduced to the LCMS in 1982 in *Lutheran Worship*. During the season of Lent the Church has traditionally omitted the Gloria in Excelsis and alleluias to emphasize the penitential nature of the season.

HYMN OF THE DAY

The 17th century in England was a golden age of Christian poetry, including today's hymn of the day. The text to *My Song is Love Unknown* was written by Samuel Crossman (1625-84) in about 1664. Even though this hymn is quite old, it didn't appear in LCMS hymnals until 1982. Crossman preceded Isaac Watts in writing English hymns in a free use of Scripture as opposed to the common practice of writing metrical paraphrases of the psalms or other portions of Scripture. This beautiful Lenten text has a strong, naïve directness, and was originally intended to be read, and not sung. The "love unknown" that constitutes this "song" is the love of Christ for sinners; specifically "my Savior's love to me." The love is unknown not only because many people don't realize what Christ has done for them, but also because God alone makes it known through the Gospel, revealing a love that is unfathomable to human reason and beyond all understanding.

The haunting melody, known as LOVE UNKNOWN, was written (according to legend) in 15 minutes on a scrap of paper by John Ireland in 1919 after he was asked for a setting to go with this text. It is a very unusual and attractive tune, with its art song-like character and irregular rhythm!

What our Church Believes, Teaches and and Confesses regarding The Lord's Supper

The Bible teaches that Jesus gives us His very body and blood along with bread and wine in Holy Communion¹, and that these are means by which He forgives our sins², strengthens us for daily living, and draws us into closer fellowship with Him and other believers. The Bible also teaches us to examine ourselves prior to receiving the meal³. For those receiving Holy Communion, examine yourself with these questions:

Do I believe that I am a sinner and am I sorry for my sins?

Do I believe that Jesus Christ is God's Son and my personal Savior?

Do I believe that Christ's true body and blood are present in this holy meal for my forgiveness?

Do I truly intend with the help of God to correct my sinful life?

Our Lord invites to His table those who trust His words, repent of all sin, and set aside any refusal to forgive and love as He forgives and loves us, that they may show forth His death until He comes. Those who are not members of a Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod congregation and have not communed at Immanuel previously are asked to speak with a pastor prior to the service. Those who are of a different confession (i.e., church body)⁴ or are unsure about communing, are invited to come forward during distribution with their hands folded in prayer, or held close to the chest and receive a blessing.






Invocation, Confession of Sins, and Absolution





Nicene Creed


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



Communion Confession

- **P** The Lord's Supper is God's gift for Christians who are properly instructed. In communing, we want people to receive Christ's body and blood for their good. This means that as you come to the Lord's Table you affirm with each communicant that Jesus is your Savior and Lord; and with Lutheran Christians you confess:
- I recognize and confess that I am a sinner. I repent of my sin and ask God's forgiveness.

I believe that Jesus Christ is my only Lord and Savior from sin, Satan and death.

I believe that the risen Christ is really present in the Sacrament and, under the form of the bread and wine, I receive His true body and blood for the forgiveness of my sins and the strengthening of my faith and life.

(Augsburg Confession – Article X)

I resolve to dedicate my life to the service of my Lord in His Body, the Church, by regular group worship, sacrificial giving, thankful living and **sharing the Gospel with others.** (*Romans* 12:1)

Consecration - The Words of Our Lord


