FROM THE PASTOR

It has been over twenty years since the Disney movie *Lilo and Stitch* showed us the importance of family in one's life with that endearing line, "Ohana means family. Family means nobody gets left behind or forgotten." In the waters of Holy Baptism, as the Word of God is spoken over us, you and I are brought into the family of God; our sins are washed away and we are given a new identity in Jesus.

And while we are a family, the family of believers in Jesus doesn't go by the name "Ohana", rather together we bear the name, "Church." What does it mean to be the "Church"? There is a song in our children's hymnal, *All God's People Sing* that tells us, "**We Are the Church.**"

I am the church! You are the church! We are the church together! All who follow Jesus, all around the world! Yes, we're the church together!

The church is not a building; the church is not a steeple; the church is not a resting place; the church is a people.

We're many kinds of people, with many kinds of faces, all colors and all ages, too from all times and places.

And when the people gather, there's singing and there's praying; there's laughing and there's crying sometimes, all of it saying:

At Pentecost some people received the Holy Spirit and told the Good News through the world to all who would hear it.

I count if I am ninety, Or nine or just a baby; There's one thing I am sure about and I don't mean maybe;

I am the church! You are the church! We are the church together! All who follow Jesus, all around the world! Yes, we're the church together! On Sunday morning or Saturday evening we may say, "I am going to church," referencing the building where we will go to worship and gather with our friends and family, coming together with fellow believers to gather around those identifying markers of the "Church" (capital C) where God's Word is rightly proclaimed and His Sacraments of Holy Baptism and the Lord's Supper are administered according to Christ's command. It is a blessing and privilege to be able to go or come to church (small c) for worship.

But here is another thought. Since our baptism brings us into the Church, the entire assembly of believers in all times and places, wherever we are with others who believe in Jesus, the Church is there. Meaning, the Church is more than Sunday morning, really it is so much more. Jesus himself makes this point, "Wherever two or three are gathered in my name, there am I in the midst of them." So from Sunday morning, to bowed heads at the dinner table, to kids kneeling on the athletic field or praying on the court, to our Bible studies and gathering with friends, to hospital bedsides, to our celebrations and the times we cry together, wherever we might gather, believers in Jesus are the Church.

And as the Church, we love and care for each other, we encourage, we forgive, we help and assist, we sacrifice and give, we show patience and understanding; as the Church we live out our faith sharing and demonstrating all the good things that come from God's Word, for that is where we learn how to live as those who are members of God's family, members of the Church. And as members of the Church, those who are a part of the household of God, we share the grace filled message of God's love and forgiveness in Jesus for everyone. For it is saving faith in this message of Jesus, that makes us a part of the Church together.

ENCOURAGING THE FRUIT OF THE SPIRIT

Our school year is going well! Students and teachers are building relationships while diving into various subjects, activities, sports and learning God's Word. One of the special ways we do this as a school is when we meet periodically as Faith Families. All students from our Junior Preschool (ages 2 and 3) through 8th grade are grouped together into a Faith Family with a staff member guiding them. There are about a dozen students in each Faith Family. A special Bible lesson or story is introduced, then families discuss and complete an activity together. It is a blessing and a sight to see!



As God works in the lives of our children every day, it is wonderful to witness when we meet as a family. This year, we are focusing on the Fruits of the Spirit. Our faculty chose this because we wanted our students to be engaged with one another in a way that encourages and emulates Christ's joy. The apostle Paul shares instructions on how to make this happen in Galatians 5: 22-23. It reads, "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness,"



goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law." These traits the Holy Spirit pours out on us gives us opportunities to be a witness of Christ to others.

Imagine a little one excited to spend time with a 6th grader who helps them color, guides them in an activity, or prays and sings a song with

them? The smiles and care exchanged during the time together creates a positive culture. The Holy Spirit works in the hearts and minds of our students. Another example is when Faith Family members pass each other in the halls and give a quick hello or high-five. It's a blessing to watch the community being built throughout the various age levels. Henry Mohrmann, ILS Class of 2020, graduated Summa Cum Laude from Parkway North High school on May 20, 2024. Henry received many awards both athletically and academically while in high school. The following are 2 of them announced in April at Parkway North's Honor Assembly:

DONNELLY-EDELMAN-MONTGOMERY AWARD

"The Donnelly-Edelman-Montgomery Award is given annually to a senior boy involved in athletics with outstanding character and leadership abilities. This award was created by the coaching staff in 1980 and the recipient is chosen by a vote of the head coaches each year. Henry has demonstrated excellent leadership as a member of our football, basketball, and boys' volleyball teams. Over Henry's senior year, he was recognized by the MFCA as 3rd Team All State Class 4 Tight End, Class 4 District 4 All District Team, Class 4 Academic All State, and SLMFCA recognized Henry as 1st Team All Tight End. He was also recognized as 1st Team All-Conference Tight End for Junior and Senior years. He was a participant in the American Cancer Society All Star Game and has signed with Washburn University to play football next year. Along with these accomplishments, Henry has also shown great leadership and high character in the classroom and the North High community."

TRI-ATHLETE AWARD

"The Tri-Athlete Award is given annually to any student who earns a varsity letter on three different athletic teams in one school year. At a time when athletes are often pressured by outside teams to specialize in a sport, this award represents dedication to North High and the athletic ability it takes to perform at a high level in multiple sports. We currently have over 500 students in our athletic program, but only three individuals have earned a varsity letter in three different sports this year. Thank you for the commitment you have given to our athletic program. Henry played football, basketball, and boys' volleyball."

HOMELESS SHELTER RELOCATED

A new home after 43 years for Sts. Peter & Paul Shelter in Soulard

Since buying the Community Campus (formerly St. Louis-Little Sisters of the Poor St. Jeanne Jugan), 3225 North Florissant Avenue in April, the Peter & Paul team has been busy with repairs, renovations, and hiring staff. The primary goal: Preparing to move the 60-bed emergency shelter from Soulard to temporary quarters on campus while the permanent shelter space is constructed. The men were moved to the Community Campus on July 16th.

"Our vision of the Community Campus goes far beyond shelter. Our staff has been incredibly supportive of the guests during this transition. Change is hard on anyone and when you are already in a state of crisis, it's even more so," said Shelter Director Teri Dunn, who has been overseeing the shelter since 2019. "Now that we are in the new space, we see so much progress with the overall outlook among the guys."

"The Jugan Shelter, formerly the Soulard Shelter, is on schedule to begin opening more beds in September and reach its final expanded capacity of 100 men by January. The shelter is named after Jeanne Jugan, the founder of the Little Sisters of the Poor, an order of nuns who worked on the campus site for more than a century serving those living in need. As we embark on the construction of the shelter space, we are simultaneously planning the expansion of other PPCS programs and working to build strategic partnerships to provide much needed transitional and supportive housing options. We will serve not just our clients, but other nonprofit agencies and local community members working toward a better tomorrow."

"With more than 4,000 people on the waiting list for subsidized housing through the St. Louis Housing Authority, not to mention the nearly 2,000 people who are homeless and isolated in St. Louis, we know that creating more affordable housing options is the right thing, the humane thing to do," said PPCS CEO Anthony D'Agostio. "Homelessness and housing insecurity are symptoms of a much bigger societal issues. Together, we will prevail helping people to a stable future."

New Jobs Thanks to Slate

"PPCS is launching a robust jobs program to give our clients a hand up. With a \$450,000 award from SLATE (St. Louis Agency on Training and Employment), we will be providing living wages for at least 100 workers over the next year. Participants in our work incentive program will not only receive living wages, they will receive job training and the chance to be promoted and receive bonuses based on the merit of their work. The work will focus on community beautification projects in the neighborhoods surrounding the Community Campus and in other areas with reported high visibility needs. The goals are to help men who are homeless build the skills they need for a long-term employment success, while paying them enough to begin saving for permanent housing," said PPCS CEO Anthony D'Agostino. The program begins in October and will be funded for a full year. The award is one of the final disbursements of federal COVID ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) funds through the City of St. Louis.




